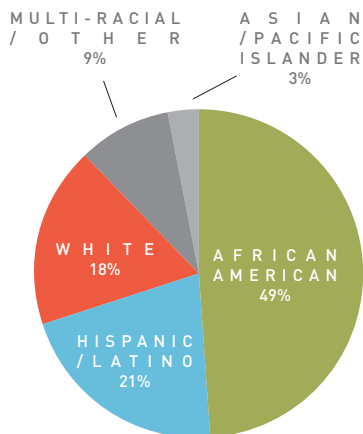


WE ARE CHIARTS

The mission of The Chicago High School for the Arts (ChiArts®) is to provide artistically gifted, diverse Chicago high school students intensive pre-professional training in the arts, combined with a comprehensive college preparatory curriculum. Each year, ChiArts serves 600 scholar-artists across five conservatories--Creative Writing, Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts--with the goal of shaping them into creators, thinkers, and active citizens whose participation in the arts and culture will enrich their lives and society at large.

17 winners in the prestigious national YoungArts competition.

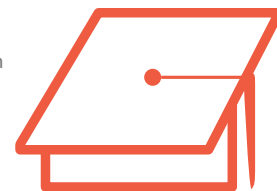

Multiple entrants in the All-City Senior Portfolio Exhibition each year.

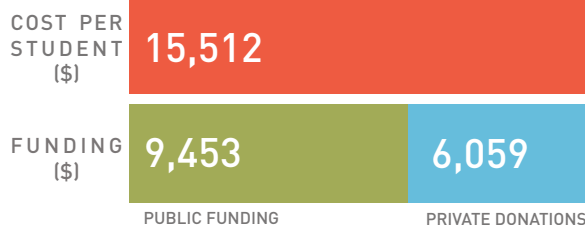
College acceptances to prestigious institutions like Dartmouth College, Northwestern University, and the School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

92% of the Class of 2016 graduated within four years. 100% of graduates were accepted into college.



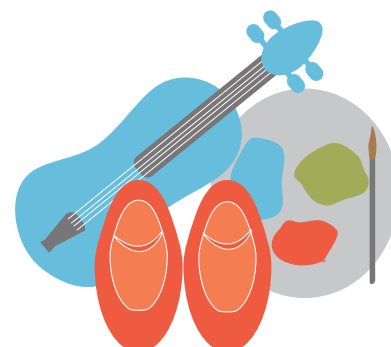
ABOUT CHIARTS:



More than 50% of ChiArts students come from low-income families. ChiArts raises more than \$3 million annually from private donors to underwrite the arts conservatories.
